Trafficking in Persons in Southeast Asia and the Sexual and Economic Exploitation of Young People in Japan

Human trafficking constantly evolves to meet the demands of criminals.

However, the core structure – exploiting the vulnerable for profit – remains unchanged. In the late 1980s and early 1990s, women from the Philippines and Thailand were trafficked into Japan's sex industry. More recently, trafficking patterns have shifted, with cases of special fraud and sexual exploitation flowing back from Japan to Southeast Asia.

This seminar will examine the current state of human trafficking in Thailand and neighboring Southeast Asian countries (Myanmar, Laos, Indonesia, etc.) and explore the vulnerabilities of young Japanese individuals to various forms of exploitation, both sexual and economic. We will also highlight the efforts of civil society groups combating these issues and discuss the barriers that prevent women and girls from speaking out. We look forward to your participation.
